We appreciate everything you do to make sure that teachers and students can focus on instruction. We treasure your contributions to our school and we thank you for your time, your creativity, and your commitment to our mission. I'd especially like to send a shout-out to my media center volunteers, both familiar and new, who have learned how to circulate and shelve books for us. You tackled the task quickly, and have been dealing with huge numbers of students checking in and checking out books. To my new library volunteers, as well as to my returning ones, we need you and we appreciate you. As one of our students said marching out of the media center with an armful of books: “Yes, the media center was open!”



Media Moments

Our summer was, amazingly, calm this year. Although we held a summer media program, we didn't see any building renovations or hear any machinery. So it was wonderful to come back to work in August and just breathe for a minute. But, that's really all we had. A minute. Mrs. Wilson, our media assistant, is “full time” again this year, which is an enormous blessing. However, as I sat across from her yesterday, I asked her: do you feel any less time-stressed now that you're here more of the day? We simultaneously laughed and agreed that the answer is a resounding “no”! Our media center work – supporting staff and students -- is like water. It fills a vacuum regardless of how large or small that vacuum is! So I must repeat my mantra again: I stubbornly feel

that open circulation is the ONLY way to encourage readers and the ONLY way we can maintain that kind of a program is through media volunteers. The [signup genius app](#) is on our homepage and I encourage you to please sign up and spend a few hours helping us help our students. Our volunteers are the engine that keeps the media center open for us during the instructional day and we all, students and teachers alike, are grateful for their efforts.

We started the year with one week of media and computer lab orientation. And then immediately began our integrated inquiry projects for our fourth and fifth grade classes.

Kindergarten is in the process of discovering how a media center is organized, and why. They are examining the differences between fiction and nonfiction books, and exploring their preferences. We are becoming familiar with call numbers, especially for our fiction books, and exploring how call numbers are structured, and how that structure helps us find our books in the media center.

First grade has, for the first time this year, a small research project which we will begin towards the end of the marking period. The curriculum connecting writing and information literacy has been updated this past summer, so we will explore what features animals use to survive - the animal we're focusing on is the ant!

Second grade's first inquiry investigation is the Nutrition project. We are defining nutrition as we explore E-books; create and organize our own questions; locate information in trade books; and organize that information on a graphic organizer. We are in "food group" teams, and will use the information we gather for our writing.

Third grade's community action investigation is just starting. We will define civic engagement and common good by exploring an E-book and trade books, and analyze our student-created questions about environmental stewardship. Before beginning our research, we want to ensure that we understand what that means. Our goal is to understand why participating in a project that helps our planet is so important and to share our understanding through informative writing which will connect to a project that the third grade team is planning with Black Hills Regional Park.

Fourth grade changed the focus of their historical fiction project from Colonial times to the Woodland Tribes of the Northeast Region to better connect with their social studies content. It was an incredible journey through time, which gave our students perspective and information on one of over 500 American Indian tribes and their cultures which lived in our country before it was settled by Europeans. We used print and nonprint resources to collect details that will enable our students to write a historical fiction story set in that time period. We explored how facts abound in good historical fiction in order to make the story authentic and believable.

Fifth grade researched biomass and biofuels in the media center, which will lead to independent research on various energy resources and creating a proposal for the best energy resource to power the amusement park ride they are designing in science. We modeled note-taking from print and nonprint resources, ethical research, analyzing and evaluating information and resources for bias, as well as for our purposes.

Above all, this marking period is focused on the skill of collaboration. So all of the media lessons involve teaching the skill and the process of collaboration. We do a lot of group work, a lot of restating and discussing, a lot of consensus building, which is integral to each step of these investigations. It is encouraging to listen to some of the group discussions as they explore their topics and their resources.

We are for the first time this year (we like firsts in the media center, we have a lot of them!) capturing our TV news broadcasts. This will enable all of our classes to see the broadcasts and also allow us to upload them onto our homepage. Look for a link on our homepage!

In the meantime, please enjoy Destiny Quest with your students – browse the books they could check out the next time they come to the media center. I can think of no better homework!

Fall Harvest Festival


